
Impact

Housing and Labelling

- Determining the appropriate archival housing for materials
- Putting materials in archival housings (mylar sleeves, paper negative envelopes, etc.)
- Dismantling and rehousing items like albums, as needed

- Publication in Archives West and UW Digital Collections








Research and Arrangement


- Researching the background and context of visual materials
- Creating historical background material for finding aid
- Identifying people and places shown in photos and other materials
- Determining appropriate order for materials if not in a prearranged order



Digital Processing and Surrogate Creation

- Creating appropriate series and subseries for materials
- Using XMetaL Author to encode information about collection items and create finding aids
- Scanning images to create digital surrogates
- Adding links for digital image surrogates
