## LOW BROW/ HIGH CULTURE EXHIBIT

The lowbrow art movement originates in underground comics, punk music, graffiti, and hot rod art styles out of California from the 1950s and 1960s, The style that encompassed characteristics such as painting of uniquely grotesque characters on the hood of custom styled vehicles. Through the emergence of this vastly unique and populist art movement, artists often developed their own style through the appropriation of mass-produced items and individualizing these items through one-of-a-kind customization. This signature style was displayed primarily in underground art scenes, such as on band memorabilia, comics, and political posters.

- Create interest in previously undiscovered materials in Special Collections that pertain to the lowbrow art movement
- Create a multimedia experience within the exhibit
