Content Accessibility in the COVID Era: Controlled Digital Lending Curation in Theological Studies

Opportunity: The Digital Theological Library has a growing Controlled Digital Lending collection that needs to be made accessible to subscribing schools and individuals.

What is Controlled Digital Lending? "[It] is a method that allows libraries to loan print books to digital patrons in a "lend like print" fashion, [using] technical controls to ensure a consistent "owned-to-loaned" ratio, meaning the library circulates the exact number of copies of a specific title it owns, putting controls in place to prevent users from redistributing or copying the digitized version."

Actions: My work involved metadata curation in the OCLC environment and the access controls established in the LlbGuides and DropBox environments in order to make these files accessible.

Benefits: I have added nearly 3,000 digital files to the CDL collection, which directly benefits subscribers to the library at a time when physical access to collections is significantly limited due to Covid-19.
