Diversity Audit of Longview Public Library's Adult Collection

Information Problem

Longview Public Library is looking to diversify their book collection by expanding the variety of author's and character's identities included in their collections. Specifically, they wish to expand their collections to have more representation of non-white races, LGBTQ+ community members, are disabled or neurodiverse persons, and adherents of non-Christian religions.



Project Objectives

- Research diversity audit methodologies.
 - We chose to utilize a random sampling method, which gave us 383 (nonfiction) and 376 (fiction) titles to audit.
- Conduct the diversity audit by determining which titles had diverse authors and/or characters along the axes of race/ethnicity, LGBTQ+, religion, disability, and/or neurodiversity.
- Research local (Washington state) and national demographics to create benchmarks against which the results of the audit will be measured.
- Create a list of recommendations of where the collection development team should focus their acquisition and weeding efforts in order to most effectively diversify the collection, as well as providing a list of purchasing resources where the team can find diverse books.

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Project Insights

The results of the audit showed that 23.5% of the nonfiction titles and 15.96% of the fiction titles were diverse.

Our Solution

We recommended that the collection development team focus their purchasing efforts in the order below. This ranking was determined by the discrepancy between the percentages of current representation in the collection and in local and national data (1 being the largest discrepancy and 5 being the smallest):

- 1. Disability
- 2. Race
- 3. Neurodiversity
- 4. Religion
- 5. LGBTQ+



Evaluation of Project Experience

We determined that diversity audits, though imperfect, are a good place to start if a library wants to evaluate the levels of diversity in their collection. When auditing, we emphasized that some axes of identity - especially sexuality, neurodiversity, and disability - aren't immediately apparent when researching an individual author. It is important to recognize that unearthing and revealing such information can have significant consequences. We have found the diversity audit process to be a good starting place when diversifying a collection, but true change occurs in future purchasing and weeding decisions and other choices library staff make when curating their collections' materials.



Next Steps

We agreed with Longview Public Library leadership that further diversity audits of their juvenile, young adult, and media collections were necessary. These future efforts will utilize the methodology, framework, and research compiled in this project and will take place over the coming months.
