Project overview

This capstone project is a **field report** defining how my **professional information practice** has been informed by my **library and information science skills** while working on issues related to:

- misinformation
 & online rumors
- networked conspiracism
- sociotechnical harms

- extremist propaganda
- terrorism crisis informatics
- platform trust & safety
- managing digital collections of harmful information



Slowly and then all at once

The impacts of accelerating technological and social change have flowed into all corners of our present life.

Over the past 10 years, in response to online-offline crises, new professional and academic disciplines have emerged that study and attempt to address harms at the intersection of digital information and social conflict & violence.

In 2021, I left my previous career to also work on these issues. At the same time, I realized it was critical for me to pursue this work through the study of Library and Information Science. I jumped in and, whether through good luck or bad, landed directly in the middle of the *digital crisis*.

Initially a study of other professionals' practices

Initially, my plan was to study how other researchers & practitioners in my professional network carry out their work on various crisis issues. However, I failed to crystalize the scope, aims, and execution of this first project. Ultimately, I pivoted to a different project idea to gain a new perspective.

By zooming in to first define and contextualize my own professional work, I hoped I could situate myself and explain what I do within the broader ecosystem of crisis disciplines. Methods

Making libraries from rabbit holes

This process led me to identify the scope of the various and intersecting social information problems I work on as '**digital crisis work**', and to define the unique professional role I play in this space as '**digital crisis librarianship**'



Digital crisis librarianship helps people and organizations find and make sense of information about extreme and harmful subjects in a fractured and adversarial information environment

Digital crisis librarians provide information services for researchers, analysts, policy-makers, trust & safety professionals, and more, dealing with issues like disinformation and extremism.

This project identified *five areas of focus* for **digital crisis librarianship**,

comprising 3 <u>key information services</u> and 2 <u>areas of ethical and professional</u> <u>responsibility</u>.

Digital crisis librarianship areas of focus



Digital crisis information services

Serving the information needs of digital crisis professionals and communities: understanding their information worlds and interactions, organizing key information resources, and providing reference and research services

Supporting rapid response information work, digital research and archiving, meta-literacy of digital cultures and online-offline behavior, and locating and representing extreme subjects in a disordered & manipulated information environment 01 Extreme subject matter librarianship

02 Crisis informatics & adversarial information research

03 Harmful information & data management Running sustainable and trustworthy digital repositories for harmful information across the lifecycle of data management, curation, and preservation including: research data libraries, digital evidence collections, platform content moderation systems, etc.

Ethical and professional responsibilities

Addressing critical social and ethical questions about power and harm in information: critical classification. epistemic pluralism, racial and indigenous justice, intellectual freedom, privacy & surveillance. sociotechnical harms, and reflexive issues of bias and control in information systems



Leading and managing digital crisis organizations with a focus on professional ethics, cultural competence and diversity, worker wellbeing and safety, and contending with institutional harms and vocational awe in crisis information work

Clear understanding of my career direction

The main outcome of this project was developing a clear vision for the future direction of my professional career by articulating a unique career track that can be employed across various digital crisis disciplines and that brings together all of my ongoing work, interests, and knowledge.

Reframing the value of my work right now

The project also helped me reframe the daily professional work I do right now by clarifying the context and value of the professional services I provide while revealing several key projects I can pursue or collaborate on to support other digital crisis workers (like my project sponsor).

Write and publish an academic paper

My goal is still to write and publish a field report on digital crisis librarianship



Develop awareness in my professional community

After writing this article, I plan to socialize this unique area of information services and support for digital crisis workers within my professional community



Collaborate on digital crisis library projects
