- Center on Contemporary Arts 501-C-3 nonprofit
- Origins: working PNW artist coalition est. 1980
- International & local artist network, gallery space (Pioneer Square, Seattle WA), & archives
- CoCA Archives founded & serendipitously generated, 2013
- Artists comprise at least 25% of the board of trustees
- Funding: seasonal grants, largely from donors & 4Culture
- Anna Hurwitz (another MLIS online student) coordinates CoCA special projects, grants, archives, & volunteers/interns

INVENTORY & ASSESSMENT

- ► Inventory: collaborated with fellow MLIS CoCA intern -- Megan Mitchell
- Over 120+ initial items in VHS, 8mm, audio cassette, U-matic formats
- Megan guided the research into what we should include, not process (repatriate), and prioritize in digitization ~ 75 items

STORAGE SHORT TERM

- ►Storage on various HDs during digitization process
- ► Keep the originals, onsite dry storage(for now)

CHALLENGES

- ► Identification of materials & background research -- title, if shown at CoCA, artist, copyright requirements sometimes unclear
- Customizing approach based on CoCA's unique vision, resources & needs
- Typical non-profit funding (or lack thereof)
- Warping of tapes & other physical preservation challenges
- Archives break-in/security issues

- Need for further cataloging, metadata, & long-term preservation solutions
- Importance of collaboration, esp with the inventory
- Being deliberate with our preservation plan fitting into CoCA's organization plan & resources

- CoCA could utilize student efforts & help future UW MLIS, Museology students deepen their learning!

- Need for a Preservation Plan that takes into account both best practices & the limitations of the organization.
- Art and arts orgs will continue to evolve, as will technology
- Public access, online hosting/viewing
- Future merging/host institution merge & public ed/engagement programming
